

Your Vote Counts

he Licking County Soil & Water **Conservation District (LCSWCD)** has a five member Board of Supervisors elected by landowners and residents of Licking County to help quide the District's mission. The elected members are responsible for conducting business within the scope of the laws and rules that govern professionalism, LCSWCD with efficiency and effectiveness. The Ohio Soil & Water Conservation Commission will cause an election of two (2) Supervisors of the LCSWCD to be held in accordance with Chapter 1515 of the Ohio Revised Code on November 5, 2015. The three year terms will begin January 1, 2016. The two candidates with the most votes will be announced at the end of LCSWCD Annual Banquet on November 5, 2015.

Voters may cast their ballot one of the following three ways:

1. Vote on Thursday, November 5, 2015 from 5:30 p.m.–6:30 p.m., at Heritage Hall, 1058 E. Main St, Newark, Ohio.

2. Cast an absentee ballot at the LCSWCD office on or before 3:00 p.m., Thursday, November 5, 2015.

3. Cast an absentee ballot by mail by completing Licking County Resident Request for Absentee Ballot form (on other side); mail to LCSWCD office by October 30, 2015.

PRESERVING LAND AND WATER Targeted Pollutant: SEDIMENT

When discussing water pollution there are several pollutants that are most often brought up: trash and litter; chemicals, oil. These substances undoubtedly have negative impacts on our waterways. Interestingly, none of them are actually top contaminants of water. Listed by the US Environmental Protection Agency, the top pollutants in our streams and rivers are bacteria, nutrients, and the number one cause of polluted waters... sediment.

Often called soil, dirt, or earth, sediment is the naturally occurring material created by erosional forces. Though it is the result of a natural process, it becomes a nasty pollutant when it enters our waterways. As sediment makes water cloudy (turbid), it increases water temperature, because the suspended particles absorb more heat from sunlight. The increased temperature then lowers the amount of dissolved oxygen in the water, because oxygen dissolves in



colder water. These interactions reduce habitat quality for many aquatic species, especially those that require colder water or higher dissolved oxygen concentrations.

Licking Soil & Water is committed to protecting our water resources from sediment. For example, Licking Soil & Water reviews and inspects proper sediment and erosion controls on new construction sites. In cooperation with the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), Soil & Water works to implement various conservation techniques on agricultural

armland preservation has been a tremendously successful program in Licking County. Since 2009, Licking Soil & Water has helped bring nearly 3 million dollars of farmland preservation funding into the county.

Licking Soil & Water plans to be a Certified Local Sponsor for the 2016 funding round of the Ohio Department of Agriculture's (ODA) Local Agricultural Easement Purchase Program (LAEPP). Licking Soil &

operations that reduce erosion and runoff. Through the Stream Team program, trained volunteers monitor water quality in rivers and streams throughout the county.

Here are some ways that you can help in promoting good sediment controls at home:

• Let lawns and yards grow longer and don't mow the grass as short. More vegetation means slower water flow over your yard after it rains, which results in less potential for erosion.

• Leave vegetated buffer zones along streams on your property. Removing trees and brush next to streams will kill the roots that hold that stream-side soil in place. Keeping vegetated buffers will also allow you to keep your soil.

• Utilize rain barrels and rain gardens to control stormwater. Increased stormwater, caused by impervious surfaces like roofs and driveways, causes more potential for sediment to be picked up and deposited in streams. Reducing the amount of stormwater will reduce sedimentation.
