Grass Clippings, Leaves, and Branches Oh My!

ummer is now upon us and for some, that means yard work. Mowing the lawn may leave you with bags full of grass clippings. After trimming the hedges or just some general weeding, you may end up with a large pile of twigs and vegetation. And after heavy summer storms, you can find people all across Licking County picking up tree branches from their yards. All of these activities usually lead to us asking, What do I do with all of this vard waste?

Below are some yard waste best management practices:

• Compost it! If you have your own compost pile or compost tumbler at home, GO YOU! You get the added benefit of producing rich soils to add to a garden or flower beds at no cost to you.

• Drop it off! There are several locations in Licking County that accept yard waste free of charge,

including Hope Timber, Elm Recycling, Kurtz Brothers and The Compost Farm. These businesses recycle yard waste into mulch or compost.

• Do not dump yard waste in ditches, streams, or low-lying wet spots! It pollutes our waterways with excess nutrients, and fertilizer and pesticide residue. Instead, start a compost pile in a drier location away from water.

• Use scheduled pickup days! Manyofourlocal communities have scheduled pickup days in the fall for tree limbs and leaves. If collecting for a local curb-side pickup, do not leave open piles on curbs or near storm drains. Debris can be destructive to stormwater systems, causing them to clog and overflow after rainfalls. Instead, bag your waste in paper or decomposable waste bags, as is often required by local communities.

Licking County River Round Up Planned

• ave the date for Saturday, September 12, 2015. This year, for the 21st anniversary of the River Round Up, the goal is to continue to branch out into the community and clean up more waterways throughout the county. Some additions for 2015 include: sections of the South Fork Licking River in Heath and Kirkershville, and Muddy Fork in Pataskala. Other sections include South Fork in Pataskala and Union Township, North Fork Licking River in St. Louisville and around Everett Park in Newark, Licking River from Riverview Reserve in Newark through Blackhand Gorge, Raccoon Creek in Granville, and the stormwater ditch system in Hebron.

NEWS FROM OUR PARTNERS Introduction to Forestry Workshop Planned

DNR Service Foresters John Kehn and Andy Sabula, covering Morrow, Licking, Knox, Perry, Cuyahoga, Geauga, and Summit Counties will host an "Introduction to Forestry" class on Friday July 24th 2015 at 7778 Priest Hollow Dr. Frazeysburg, Ohio 43822. Space is limited to the first 35 participants who register.

Service Foresters work with private landowners on all aspects of forest management from tree planting through harvesting. The topics covered in this class will include selling timber, how trees grow, property tax reduction programs, improving the quality and growth of your trees, and the economics of forestry.

The class will commence at 9 a.m. and conclude at 3 p.m. Dress

for the weather; the event will be outside rain or shine. Please bring a sack lunch and a folding chair. There is no cost to participate.

This class does count for Ohio Forest Tax Law credit but does NOT cover the required "Core" class, which is held periodically at various locations in the state. The two classes will not cover the same material.

Depending on participation levels, in addition to the "Introduction to Forestry" class, subsequent classes covering specific topics such as "Timber Stand Improvement", and "Timber Marketing" in more detail will be offered throughout the year in various locations in the state.


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Master Gardener Open House

icking County Master Gardener Volunteers of Ohio State University Extension, will host their Demonstration Garden Open House on Saturday, July 18 from 10 a.m.– 1 p.m.

Master Gardeners will be on hand to answer gardening questions. Demonstrations will be given. Enjoy the music and food provided while strolling through the gardens. Don't forget to bring your camera!

Gardens include: Food Pantry Garden (last year 3,200 pounds of food was donated to the Salvation Army Food Pantry), Fairy Gardens, Perennial Cutting Gardens, Pollinator Gardens and Phenology Garden (Part of OSU/ Wooster research), Certified Butterfly Garden, Herb, Memorial Gardens, Raised beds, Hops, and Ornamental Grasses.



NEWS FROM OUR PARTNERS Pollinators need YOUR help!

Pollinators, such as butterflies, moths, bees, hummingbirds, and other insects, play a crucial role in the production of most fruits and vegetables grown in Ohio, including summer favorites such as strawberries, peaches, apples, cucumbers, squash, tomatoes, and watermelons. In the United States pollination by honey bees and other pollinators contributed to over \$29 billion of crops in 2010. Pollinators are also important in nature because only pollinated plants produce seeds, and these seeds will eventually produce new plants, providing food and habitat for a diverse array of wildlife.

The importance of pollinators to both humans and wild places has been recognized at the highest levels. On May 19, 2015, The White House released the National Strategy to Promote Health of Honey Bees and Other Pollinators, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture has designated June 15-21 National Pollinator Week. Governor Kasich recently signed a proclamation designating this same week as Ohio Pollinator Week. Federal and State wildlife agencies, including the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife, are reaching out to Ohio's landowners to help protect and restore pollinator populations. In addition, the USFWS has created the statewide Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative (OPHI). OPHI is a collaborative effort, working with numerous partners such as ODNR,

Ohio Department of Transportation, The Ohio State University, American Electric Power, Licking Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD), to create and/or improve pollinator habitat across the State of Ohio and increase pollinator conservation awareness of all Ohioans.



Check out these tips to promote pollinators in your own backyard:

1. Plant your garden with pollinator-friendly flowers that provide nectar for food throughout the growing season.

2. Pollinators need different food during different life stages. Add plants to your yard that provide food and habitat for caterpillars.

3. Avoid or minimize the use of pesticides and herbicides in your garden and on your lawn. If chemicals must be used, select a variety that targets just your problem, follow the directions on the label exactly, and apply only to problem areas.

4. Leave un-mowed areas along fence lines, streams, wet areas, roads, and other out of the way places. These patches of habitat provide homes for pollinators and great pollinator plants, such as common milkweed.

Preserving Farmland

icking Soil & Water continues to work with landowners on conservation options and help place agricultural easements on their farmland. As a 2015 Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) Certified Local Sponsor, Licking Soil & Water received \$351,175 to purchase an easement on the highest-scoring farm. In addition, Licking Soil & Water applied for \$178,650.00 in federal matching funds that if received, may allow for one to two more farms to be funded.

An agricultural easement is a legal agreement to limit development on a parcel(s) of land. The landowner continues to own the land and can sell, gift or transfer it. The easement remains with the land and is binding on future owners.

ODA oversees the Local Agricultural Easement Purchase Program (LEAPP) and uses soil types, proximity to protected conservation land, planning, development pressure, local comprehensive planning and other factors for scoring applications.
