

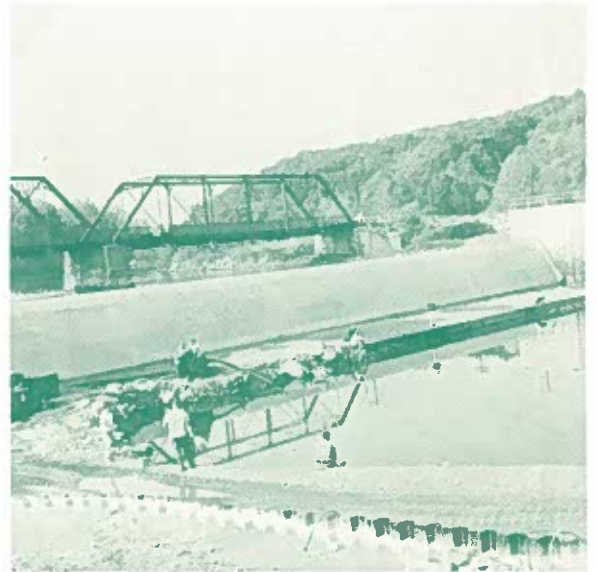

STATE ISSUE NO. 1  
Merle Scheetz, County Agricultural Agent

Through the years the Extension Service has become known as a somewhat impartial merchant of ideas and the truth. Now the time has come when I can urge you to vote for a certain question on the ballot this November 5. This is State Issue No. 1.

What is State Issue No. 1? It is a long range plan endorsed by many folks in Ohio to raise \$250 million for the improvement of public institutions of higher education, conservation, water facilities, and recreation areas.

By 1972, it is conservatively estimated that there will be 360,000 students enrolled in our colleges and universities--or nearly double the present enrollment. With today's facilities they can't possibly handle this great increase on new students to come. It is this same group of youngsters that is now overloading our local school systems and causing some agonizing bond issues.

In addition Ohio is missing the boat on new industry. This can and will lead to serious problems in future opportunities for our children. Ohio used to be second in total manufacturing activities; now we're fourth.

The nice thing about voting yes for Issue No. 1 is that taxes will not go up. We are voting on whether or not to continue a one cent-per-pack tax on cigarettes that is already being collected. In 1955 Ohions approved this tax on cigarettes for similar purposes. A "yes" vote for State Issue 1 merely continues this tax on cigarettes.

Some folks say that we should wait until we have the money for such things. Our boys and girls can't wait. It will take two years to see a building after the issue is approved. The interest on the bonds will be high; but what do you think it will cost to build ten years from now? We are a growing area. Vote yes! State Issue No. 1.
