

Stream Team Training

Soil & Water's first stream team training of 2024 is April 2 from 5:30-7:30 pm at Karr Park in Pataskala! Licking County Stream Team is a Citizen Science Water Quality program focused on the health of our County's streams and rivers. Volunteers will be trained and equipped with the knowledge to identify common orders of macroinvertebrates, assess the health of the stream and surrounding habitat, and test for some common chemical parameters, including dissolved oxygen, nitrate, and phosphate.

Plant Native this Spring!

This warm weather has us all thinking about gardening extra early this year. Consider Native Plants this spring when planning your yard/garden! Native plants have been adapting to Ohio's climate for hundreds of years, making them more suitable for surviving our cold winters and dry summers. Through their evolution, they have co-



evolved with wildlife which makes them a crucial source of food and habitat for birds, bees, butterflies, and many other organisms.

The root systems of native plants are considerably deeper than their non-native counterparts and thus create anchors and protect our soils from erosion during storm events. After it rains, deep roots help soak up excess water and nutrients and therefore protect our local waterways from flooding and pollution.

Reasons to Plant Native:

- They are more drought tolerant, so less watering!
- They are hardier than non-native species, requiring less fertilizer.
- Native plants provide food and habitat for birds, bees, butterflies, and other wildlife.
- They have deeper root systems which helps to soak up excess rainfall and prevent erosion.
- They provide beautiful landscapes.

When planting this spring, plant native!



The River Round Up Poster Contest

The River Round Up Poster Contest is open to all school-aged youth living in and/or attending school in Licking County (public, private, and home school; K-12). Posters submitted must reflect water pollution awareness and encourage volunteer participation in the River Round Up.

- Poster Awards: \$100 is awarded to the student artists of the winning posters (one from each of the three categories, below) and \$500 to the student's school for advancing science and art programming.
- The winning poster artwork will be used as the primary electronic marketing images for the 2024 River Round Up event. Winning posters will be displayed at River Round Up Event sites on September 7, 2024, and in promotional displays around Licking County throughout the year.
- Categories: Elementary (K-4), Middle/Intermediate School (5-8), and High School (9-12). One winner will be chosen from each grade category.
