

INTRODUCING NEW BOARD MEMBER

TIMELY TIP

Running short of hay? Want a good buy on some high quality feed shortly after the first of April? You can get it by treating your bluegrass pasture with nitrogen now. Use 50-60 lbs. actual nitrogen per acre and treat about one acre for each three cows.

Good pasture will supply the nutrients for 25 lbs. of milk production per cow per day. In 30 days that's 750 lbs. of milk. At \$4.00 cwt. that's \$30.00. \$2.50 worth of nitrogen can do the job.

"SUPERIOR AWARD"

At the Ohio Federation of Soil Conservation Districts annual meeting in Columbus, the Licking County Soil & Water Conservation District was given a framed "Superior" certificate. This is the highest award given by the Ohio Federation. It is presented annually to those districts that score over 825 points in the Federation's Distinctive Service contest.

This is the second consecutive year and the third time our district has received this honor.



Trees have a place on nearly every farm. Consider them in developing your farm conservation plan. Trees hold soil, increase water intake, provide food and cover for wildlife and will grow on soils unsuited to other plants. These benefits happen long before they reach sawlog size. In many cases, benefits start immediately after planting.

Two mechanical tree planters are available for rent from the Licking County Soil & Water Conservation District. One is a pull-type, the other is adapted to a 3-point hook up. If you would want to use one of these, see us soon.

LICKING COUNTY'S 1964 SOIL FERTILITY MONTH by Merle Scheetz - County Agricultural Agent

In March, Licking County farmers and the folks in Agri-Business will observe Soil Fertility Month. Sometimes observances mean pausing and reflecting. This observance means getting out and doing things.

For farm folks, it will mean collecting soil samples from fields planned for crops this year. Many Licking County fields were tested in 1960, and now it is time to test those fields again. A number of acres are coming out of the soil bank, and these should be tested to produce the most dollars in 1964.

Soil testing has a special meaning and value for Licking County farmers. They blazed the trail for the state in Soil Fertility activity a few years ago. Also, Licking County soils are such a mixed-up mass of types and kinds, that the only way to make absolutely sure that the lime and fertilizer dollars are doing their best job is to have a soil test.

Thirty special stations for receiving the Soil Samples will be in operation from March 16 to 28. If you collect samples during the early part of the month, you will be able to bring them to the stations during the last two weeks.

Special events are also planned for the month. Headliner will be the county-wide 100 bushel corn club banquet. This is scheduled for March 9. In addition to recognizing the top corn growers in the county for 1963, a special discussion on breaking the 200 bushel barrier will be featured. The S&WCD office, Vocational-Agriculture teachers, or the Extension office will have more information about reservations and the place. Contact one of them.

BETTER MEADOW STANDS

Your chances of a successful meadow seeding in small grain this spring can be greatly improved if you use band seeding. The diagram shows a way of adapting a drill to this method. The addition of the packer wheels is an improvement but just fixing the seed tubes as shown has given excellent results.


WILDLIFE AS A CROP
